To Friends . . . Old and New . . .

Since 2002, I have been writing a Chairman's Letter to introduce our Annual Report and this year I'm delighted to say that Fighting Chance is celebrating its 10^{th} Anniversary.

One of the highlights of 2011 was launching a campaign to raise an endowment fund; it now has approximately \$680,000 in cash and pledges that, once paid in full, will bring the fund close to \$1,000,000.

We also are just beginning a 10 year lease on our newlyconstructed office space overlooking the wharf in Sag Harbor, and, both patients and staff seem very comfortable with the new quarters.

I sometimes use the phrase "built to last" because I've felt that it was important – since the day I founded Fighting Chance in 2002 – that we put down deep roots in the villages we serve so that we become an enduring part of the East End healthcare community. With our new endowment and 10 year lease, we have taken important steps toward achieving these long-term goals.

In the pages that follow, you can learn more about other activities in 2011, including our expanding staff, stories about some of the patients we have served, and our first steps towards communicating to patients and other stakeholders through social media.

Our three professionals – taken together – have more than 100 years of patient counseling experience; all of their services are free of charge.





Most patients who come to our office leave with a hard copy of the guide and find it to be an empowering tool for coping with cancer. It is also online, where it can be downloaded for free.

Support Groups

Many patients and care givers who come to Fighting Chance have a desire to participate in some form of "support group" – and we offer several of them, all led by our professionals.

Professional counseling - typically provided by an oncology social worker - is a very beneficial supplement to the purely medical treatment that a cancer patient receives. This type of counseling is the core business of Fighting Chance, and is provided free of charge. The counseling helps relieve cancer patients' hyper-anxiety and increases their sense of "empowerment" so they feel they have a real chance – a fighting chance – of beating the disease.

Urban-based hospitals often have psychosocial counselors on staff although only available to that hospital's patients. But Fighting Chance's office is "freestanding and independent" - so we can and do assist patients from all six hospitals in and around Long Island's East End. Indeed, many of the hospitals - and this is not uncommon in rural areas cannot afford to have an a oncology social worker on staff.
