are people who have to go through this and are

RIDERS ON THE STORM

A major service that Fighting Chance offers is free transportation to and from doctor's appointments, hospitals, and treatments. Among others whose services we want to acknowledge are Patsy Howard, Randolph Schwartz, and Evonne Shaternik, who have generously spent many hours in transit. Excerpted below is one patient's story.

A cancer diagnosis turns anyone's life upside down. For me, it is often hardest to cope with the most ordinary things in life. One example: the need for transportation to the weekly treatments that hold my disease at bay. My oncologist is at Stony Brook University Hospital. I live in Sag Harbor, so it takes about four hours to drive to the hospital, get my treatment and drive home.

Friends have been great in all this, but there came a time when I had no ride available, and I turned to Fighting Chance, as I know they have volunteers on hand. Frankly, I was nervous. Most people don't like asking for favors. But the Fighting Chance

volunteers did not see driving me as a favor...But instead as a labor of love. Just neighbor helping neighbor. As simple as that.

So, I was connected to a volunteer driver, who picked me up exactly on time, and took me to Stony Brook.

Over time, we became quite friendly, and this volunteer helped again and again. By now, I consider her a true friend.

It is often said that cancer is a journey. As with any journey, there is no way to know in advance who your traveling companions will be. My thanks to my new friend, and to Fighting Chance, for their help in my own journey.
